### COMMENTS:

April 1<sup>st</sup> was the kick off to the MPI distracted driving campaign. MPI paid for a variety of media advertisement educating the public on distracted driving issues such as talking on the cell phone and texting while driving. In addition to MPI advertising, the Rivers Police Service issued a media release, resulting in a front page article in the Rivers Banner (see article below). There were 37 highway traffic act charges laid as part of the enforcement component of the program. This was a partnership like in years past that involves other police agency throughout the province. This program is funded by MPI. The RM of Cornwallis police service directly assisted us in this program.

There were numerous miscellaneous calls for service and one sexual assault investigation.

We had one call for service to the RM of Daly one was an alarm call in Bradwardline which took approximately forty minutes.

I also attended Rivers Elementary school where I was introduced to the staff and student body. It was at this assembly that I announced the "Use Your Head" campaign would be running again this year. This is where officers will be stopping young people wearing their helmets when cycling, and enter their names in for a draw for a bicycle.

## Rivers to enforce distracted driving

Rivers Police Service has partnered with Manitoba Public Insurance and other police agencies throughout the province to conduct an enforcement program targeting distracted driving and other high-risk driving behaviours. The enforcement program will run throughout April and May. There will be ZERO tolerance for using a cel-

lular phone or other hand-operated electronic device while driving a vehicle. Persons found guilty will be subject to a \$203.80 fine plus demerits on their licence.

Other high-risk driving behaviour included in this program will be: failure to wear a seat belt, speeding, imprudent driving, disobeying traffic control devices.

The most important thing to

think about when driving is.... Driving! On average 25 people are killed in collisions linked to distracted driving

and 800 people are injured due to distracted driving per year on Manitoba's roads. You are four times more likely to be in a

crash if you talk on your phone while driving and 23 times more likely to be in a crash if you text and drive.
