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COMMENTS:

For the month of JULY the Rivers police Service responded to 42 various calls for Service. We had a busy month regarding Assist RCMP calls where Sgt Futrell assisted with the vehicle roll over just west of Rivers, and the double fatal at the Rivers Spillway, as well as an Assist Public call in the Chimo Beach area. The Rivers Police Service continued the MPI check stop program this month; I wanted to point out a file of interest here regarding how our members handle themselves in a professional and courteous manner during the check stop program. An individual from Alberta came through the check stop and it was learned at this time that the individual had not renewed his insurance, and he was subsequently charged. Where the story takes a twist is that the members involved gave direction as to where he could go in Rivers to renew his vehicle insurance, and allowed the individual from Alberta to have his insurance company FAX his particulars to our police service where we then forwarded that data to the local insurance agent, being from Alberta he had no cell phone service and one of the members let him use his phone for a local call. At the end of it the members had stopped for coffee, and the individual from Alberta popped into the restaurant and unknown to the members at the time he paid for everyone's coffee, and thanked the members for their help. This speaks volumes to how this individual was treated. He did get a ticket for his infraction, but was treated with respect and dignity, a job well done.
